

Disappearance to ISIS

Recently, tragedy struck in a small school just outside of London at the Bethnal Green Academy (BGA). Shockingly, three hard working students chose to leave their families behind and go join the ISIS terrorist group in Syria, they have not been the first to do so either. There are so many possible influences that could have affected their decision, from their peers, to social media, to possibly even their families and I would like to be the one to get to the bottom of this. As we all know ISIS is not known to be a friendly group of people. They try to destroy anyone who is different from them such as gays, other religions, and most baffling, women. This makes me wonder why these girls want to be a part of this association of Islamic terrorists, were they are not to be treated fairly and may even be killed. Also, just recently ISIS members have started to destroy artifacts from different cultures dating back to 1200 BC, because these cultures are different from theirs. What got into these teens heads to make them think that these ways were right, what did they see?

These comments seem to imply that people don't really care what happens to these girls and that the English Government should just give up looking.

Whether or not you agree with these sentiments, I think we can all agree on one thing. These girls will regret their decisions, and we need to stop this issue before it goes on any longer. Every day we wait to make a change in the world, more and more people throw their lives away without thinking. Do you want to be the one to sit back and watch, or do want to step up and help people all over the world?
