

Total: 120,538 sq km Land: 120,408 sq km Water: 130 sq km
(About the size of Mississippi)

Terrain

About 80% of land area is moderately high mountains separated by deep, narrow valleys and small, cultivated plains. The remainder is lowland plains covering small, scattered areas.

Cities

Capital--Pyongyang. Other cities--Hamhung, Chongjin, Wonsan, Nampo, and Kaesong.

Temperate, with rainfall concentrated in summer; long, bitter winters



The organization also has very systematic resettlement programs available to support North Korean refugees including translation, healthcare, integration and counseling services. Additionally, Liberty in North Korea educates, mobilizes and encourages others to support North Korean refugees via events and fundraisers. The organization has a thorough breakdown of how funds are distributed throughout the escape and resettlement process, and it claims that \$3,000 will save and resettle one North Korean refugee.
