2025 asked a great deal of us.

It was a year that reminded us why the World Affairs Council exists—and why our region needs a strong, resilient, globally-connected civic institution now more than ever.

We began the year navigating significant uncertainty across the international exchange and public diplomacy landscape. A series of Executive Orders, rapid shifts in federal policy, and a temporary pause in funding created real operational challenges for us and peer organizations across the country. These challenges were felt not only in our programs, but in the communities, partners, and global networks that rely on the continuity of people-to-people engagement. While the circumstances were beyond our control, our response was deeply within our character: mission-focused, determined, and grounded in partnership.

Even in that period of instability, one constant remained: the World Affairs Council of Seattle is built to endure. Our mission—connecting Seattle to the world and the world to Seattle—has carried us through geopolitical shifts, economic cycles, and moments of national debate for nearly 75 years. This year was no exception, but it was hard.

Despite the early year disruptions, the Council delivered a year of meaningful global engagement for Seattle. We welcomed international visitors, convened timely public programs, expanded our education initiatives, and strengthened our internal capacity with strategic staffing additions. Across our Community Programs, Global Classroom, and Global Leadership Exchange, we saw thousands of Seattleites engage on global issues that shape our daily lives. Students built understanding and skills. Community members heard directly from diplomats, thought leaders, and experts. Local business and civic leaders built global relationships that will influence international collaboration for years to come.

And that is the story of this year—not the turbulence, but the resilience.

The disruptions of early 2025 tested our systems, our adaptability, and our resolve. But they also displayed the strength of our network. Partners stepped in and stepped up. Community members offered support. Volunteers and hosts opened their homes. Together, we ensured that greater Seattle remained a welcoming, globally engaged city to all. This resilience is not accidental—it is the product of decades of relationship-building, community trust, and a shared understanding that global engagement is essential to who we are.

As we enter our 75th anniversary year, we are energized by what lies ahead. New initiatives—including the Global Classroom Educator Fellows program and our “Coffee with the Consul” series—will further expand our community’s access to global perspectives. We will continue to innovate, strengthen partnerships, and create meaningful opportunities for Seattleites to connect with the world. And we will keep focusing on a simple but powerful truth: the World Affairs Council helps make Seattle a place where global engagement thrives.

Because the Council is here, young people across our region can imagine themselves as, and build the skills to be, global citizens. Our community has vibrant spaces for informed, civil dialogue on international issues and their local impact. Seattle continues to build bridges with emerging leaders from around the world. And at a time when global awareness is essential, our city benefits from a dynamic, connected civic conversation that reflects curiosity, openness, and purpose.

Together, we are ensuring that Seattle remains a city that looks outward, engages thoughtfully, and leads with confidence in its global future.

Thank you for being part of this work. Your support ensures that the World Affairs Council enters its 75th year not only resilient but renewed. We invite you to stay engaged, attend programs, welcome visitors, and continue building a globally connected Seattle with us, one conversation at a time.

Community Programs


World Affairs Council Community Programs present frequent opportunities for discussion, dialogue, and debate on global issues.

International Women's Day Speed Mentorship: Each year in celebration of International Women's Day in March, women from around the Puget Sound come together as mentors and mentees to discuss career goals and best practices for personal and professional growth.

Guest Speakers and Panels: YPIN hosts civil leaders, industry professionals, scholars, and humanitarians at themed panel and guest speaker events, bringing their leadership and expertise in world affairs to Seattle's young professionals.

Global Leadership Exchange

The Global Leadership Exchange Program (GLX) advances global understanding by connecting the Seattle community with established and emerging leaders from around the world.

Through professional and youth exchanges, these people-to-people connections allow emerging leaders to build the foundation for addressing critical global issues. International exchange allows Seattle residents and visitors alike to recognize their shared values.

GLX's core initiative is the U.S. Department of State's International Visitor Leadership Program (IVLP). Launched in 1940, IVLP helps strengthen U.S. engagement with countries around the world and cultivates lasting relationships by connecting current and emerging foreign leaders with their American counterparts through short-term visits to the United States.

Since 1998, the World Affairs Council’s Global Classroom program has dedicated itself to ensuring that youth are included in conversations surrounding critical global issues. The World Citizen Essay Contest (WCEC), offered each spring, supports youth in increasing their global IQ.

In 2025, third through twelfth grade students were invited to participate in the 27th Annual WCEC by reflecting on pressing global shifts—from climate change and AI to aging populations and the future of work. Students were asked to examine both the challenges and opportunities these shifts present and propose how a country of their choice might prepare its citizens to thrive.

Student essays were insightful, imaginative, and full of heart—demonstrating the vision and empathy young people bring to building a more just and sustainable world.

The award ceremony keynote address “*From Minecraft to Mindshift: How Tech Is Shaping Tomorrow’s Global Citizens*,” featured speaker Allison Matthews, Head of Minecraft Education at Microsoft, and moderator Lindsay Hua, World Affairs Council Vice Board Chair.




